
What a title for a walk. Bernadette led this walk, and the photo includes some of the adventurers.

We started with the easiest from Myrtleford to Bright, then went uphill from Everton to Beechworth, from Wodonga to Tallangatta, and finishing up with Everton over Taylors gap to Myrtleford (all rides were 'out and back'/return).

The rail trails really show how fortunate we are to have such great scenery so close to home, plus we got to see the changing of the seasons from late summer through to the autumn colour in the vineyards.

Blue Rag Range

I've been meaning to do this walk for years, but I've not been free to book in when Deb's led it, or it's been cancelled due to bad weather forecasts. It is also one of those walks that's hard to schedule – the walk is all on an exposed ridgeline so the weather can't be too hot / early in the season or too cold / late.

Fortunately, this year everything worked, and we ended up with the perfect day for it – a bit cloudy so it wasn't too hot, but no wind or rain.

The walk is 14km return, with over 650m elevation gain, and is all either up or down – there's very little consistent flat.

The seven of us enjoyed the great views out either side of the range, but we were all struck by how little regrowth there has been subsequent to the fires. The ground was still quite visible under the dead tree stumps on the sides of the ridgelines.

Throughout the day we also frequently stopped and moved off the track as it is extremely popular with 4wds due to the expansive views.

Overall, it was good to finally do this walk, with great company, and I'd recommend that everyone tries to do it once to see the views. But I'll probably skip it for a couple of years now as up close it was a bit dry, dusty, rocky, and burnt, and there are so many more pleasant walks in the alpine region.

The weather forecast in the leadup to this walk didn't look good. Over 80% of chance of a not-inconsequential amount of rain, falling as snow above 700m. Given the walk was to start at the 'rocky bit' below Mackey's lookout, which is about 900m elevation, I was hoping the rain would fall as snow and we could proceed as planned. Otherwise the plan was to turn back at the chalet.

Fortunately the rain stopped as we parked the cars at the start point. It stayed a bit cloudy all day, but it wasn't particularly cold (the jumpers came off on the uphill sections!).




We slowly made our way over the slippery rock section and then started to encounter snow on the ground not far after Mackeys. This got thicker as we got closer to the chalet and had morning tea in the shelter. We proceeded

down past the underground river, up and out to the View point, and then had lunch in the shelter at Lake Catani.

We then headed back to the chalet and down to the cars, finishing just before 4pm. It was great to have nine walkers, including a visitor (Natasha), join me for the day.
