- Address is 265 Baranduda Blvd. for your GPS or just the north side of Boyes Rd
- Proceed along Chamomile Drive approx. 200 meters to Ray Snell Centre on right.
- Ray Snell Centre is opposite main administrative building and Homestead (Nursing Home)
- There is a flagpole flying national flag immediately in front of the BBQ area.
- There will be ample parking in the admin building car park.

## Falls Creek road closure; more details of impact on club activities

Most club members will be aware by now that a landslide above Bogong Village has necessitated a road closure between Mt Beauty and Falls Creek. Ian refers to this in his thoughts in "The Stump".

The latest estimated timeline is that the road closure will be until 10 March 2023.

There is still access to Falls Creek via the 'back way' Mitta Mitta and Glen Valley. Google advises that this will take around three and a half hours from Wodonga.

As the area surrounding Falls Creek has not been closed off, the BBC Committee will not limit club walks taking place in this area.



However, the Falls Creek resort notes that response times for emergency service in Falls Creek are currently greatly delayed as they need to come from Omeo, which is 2 hours away. In my view, this isn't too different to many of our other walks which would also take several hours for emergency services to attend if a helicopter is not available.

However, Leaders do need to take this into consideration for risk identification and mitigation – for example:

- maybe you should take the club's new defibrillator?
- whether any additional first aid supplies are appropriate?
- whether you should 'not go' if the forecast conditions are particularly conducive to bushfires (given one of the two ways off the mountain is closed off)?

In addition, the Falls Creek resort is asking anyone intending to visit/stay in the resort over the next two months to continue register their intention to visit via the [Visitor Registration Form](https://www.fallscreek.com.au/cancellation-of-events/).
