Actually, it's from the Secretary's branch, given our fearless leader is somewhere along the Great Southwest Walk, hopefully dry, warm and comfortable.

To continue along lan's theme in the last edition of Footprints, I thought we might make an uninvited foray into the innermost workings of that secretive, hostile, controlling group, the dreaded committee!

Why? I hear you ask. Well why not. They are after all your committee, charged with the task of sorting out all the administrative detail that allows our club function and get on with our reason for being, the pursuit of Bushwalking and associated activities.

Many years ago, our club decided to separate the functions of administration from all other club activities, instigating a policy whereby the committee would meet in isolation, apart from general meetings or club nights. The reasoning behind this decision appears to be lost in time but I think we can assume it was



made in an effort to streamline the important but often boring administrative requirements. And over the years it has worked.

It is, of course, predicated on the democratic requirement that all club members be eligible to sit in committee and that elections be held annually. And so, BBC committees are formed, disbanded, and reformed ad infinitim.

The current committee consists of 12 members. We meet on the 2nd Tuesday of every month except December. The meetings usually take the form of a dinner meeting at either the Birralee Hotel in Wodonga or Soden's Hotel in Albury (No interstate rivalry here). Meetings go from 6PM to about 9PM, the first hour to enjoy a meal and a drink together. Occasionally, we meet at a member's house but with all 12 members attending this can become a bit crowded.

We follow a set agenda that has proved over time, best suits our needs. The agenda is circulated to all members by the Secretary about 7 days prior to the meeting.

There are, sometimes, differences of opinion which are universally resolved in an orderly fashion. The Secretary keeps detailed minutes which are circulated to all committee members within about 7 days post meeting.

So, why this diatribe, I must confess to a hidden agenda. My aim is to reinforce lan's earlier remarks about the need for fresh blood on the committee. As previously mentioned, a significant number of committee members are not seeking reelection. Their time has come, their job well done. They need and deserve a rest.

The club, however, just can't function without a viable committee. We will always manage to bumble through somehow, but we really do need some fresh faces.

Trip Reports

Up NW Spur and down Bungalow Spur, Mt Feathertop

Saturday 3rd March was a bit warmer than we had hoped for, so we had an early start for our walk up Tom Keen/NW Spur Track.

The trailhead is just behind the trout farm 4km from Harrietville and while you start climbing almost straight away the first few kilometres were gentle compared to what lay ahead. After the second crossing of Stoney Creek, we really began to gain elevation and at the top of (what's known as) The Wall we stopped for our first smoko break.

From here the track straightens up but continues to climb, through what is now after the past few wet years, quite thick bush. The overcast skies kept the sun off us, but it was still warm and with little breeze, it seemed liked forever before we got to MUMC Hut for lunch.

At this point we were only just over 7km into our 21km walk and still had a fair bit of track to cover



before Harrietville.

The spring on the NW Spur track was our next stop, and as we knew the tank at Federation Hut was empty, we refilled our water bladders. By the time we got to Federation Hut we had walked 10.5km, exactly half, of our 21km day and gained 1640m in elevation.

Now for the final 10.5km descent down Bungalow Spur and it was all downhill. When we got to the bottom of Bungalow Spur we'd had a big day but a good day.


On the way down, Tobias was nowhere to be found at or near, Tobias Gap. We could find no pictures at Picture Point, or even points.
